2-1-1 CALL CENTER connects anyone in United Way of Central Georgia's 19 counties to resources that address every day challenges, and those that developed during times of emergency. The confidential service is free, 24/7, 7 days a week. A trained specialist is available by phone, online, or text to assist with needs such as food pantries, job search programs, family services, and financial emergencies.

BROOKDALE RESOURCE CENTER (BRC) helps alleviate homelessness in our area. UWCG partnered with Macon-Bibb Gov. to operate the center. The transitional living facility offers a customized 90-day program to families/individuals with a final goal for permanent housing and financial stability. Residents are provided shelter, meals, and through a counselor can receive health evaluations, educational support, and assistance finding a job.

COMMUNITY SCHOOLS UNITED (CSU) is a UWCG program that provides a neighborhood-based strategy providing children in low-income communities with a high-quality education and a CSU team member working within the school The program centers public schools as hubs for communities while combining a rigorous educational program as well as extended learning opportunities to include family and community engagement with an infusion of social services.

READ UNITED (RU) addresses the literacy challenges facing Central Georgia. Reading on grade level by the end of third grade is a key indicator of high school graduation and career success. Volunteers tutor kindergarten through third grade students to improve their reading skills while creating a bond with the children to become a positive influence in the child's life.





PARENTS AS TEACHERS (PAT) builds strong communities, thriving families, and children who are healthy, safe, and ready to learn. PAT matches parents/caregivers with our trained Parent Educators who make regular personal home visits to ensure optimal health and learning development during a child's earliest years in life, from prenatal through kindergarten.
